Let it Flow – January 17, 18 & 19, 2023 Painting Workshop with Susan Blackwood Watercolors

Supply List

- tracing paper
- mechanical pencil with lead cheap can be bought at the grocery store!
- Eraser white plastic (not a kneaded eraser has too much oil in it)
- Sketch book / journal book for notes and value studies
- 1 Black Prismacolor PM-98 Pen (Broad tip on one end, fine tip on the other end)
- 1 Cool Gray 50% Prismacolor PM-112 Pen (Broad tip on one end, fine tip on the other end)
- cell phone to take photos

Watercolor paper - I prefer Arches 140 # or 300# Cold press. Plan to paint quarter sheet or half sheet. I keep my colors fairly basic: Bring whatever colors that you like to use. I prefer tubes of pigments and a white palette.

Paint

Basically, I am a traditionalist.

I use a warm version and a cool version of each of the primaries (Yellow, red and blue) and then add a few extras. The following is my basic palette and has been used by traditional artists for centuries.

Cad Lemon (cool yellow)
Cad Yellow Pale (not light) (warm yellow)
Cad Orange (warmest yellow)
Cad Red (warm red)
Alizarin Crimson (Cool Red)

Ultramarine blue (warm blue) Cerulean Blue (cool blue) Thalo Green - blue shade Burnt Sienna

Some **optional extra colors** that I like but they aren't necessary:

Thalo Crimson Thalo Purple

Quinacridone Burnt Orange

However...if you prefer more transparent colors use this following list of colors instead:

New GambougeCobalt BlueWindsor RedCerulean BlueQuinaronin RedThalo GreenThalo CrimsonBurnt Sienna

Thalo Purple Transparent Red Oxide

Ultramarine Blue

Brushes

I keep to a minimum: #8 round with good point #10 round with good point

1 " flat

I also like the 1/2 inch Princeton Neptune #4750 series Dagger - It is a bit tricky to use, but once you get the hang of it, it is very versatile for small paintings and all sizes. Available at Dick Blick or Jerry's Artarama

- Paper Towels
- 2 containers for rinsing brushes in water
- Photos that you want to paint of Water, oceans, creeks, waterfalls, etc.
